Proposed Action (Who, What, When, Where, How): Calvert Allred (applicant), has applied for transfer of the grazing preference for the Bear Springs (#46360), Pima (#46370) and Mesa (#46380) Allotments within the Safford Field Office.

These allotments were designated ephemeral by decision on May 12, 1969, per special ephemeral rule dated December 5, 1968 [F.R. Doc. 68-14711]. There are no active animal unit month's (AUMs) currently associated with these grazing preferences. When forage becomes available on these allotments the permittee can file an application (Form 4130-1) specifying the number and kind of livestock, period(s) of use, and AUMs. After inspection of the allotment(s) a grazing bill will be issued according to this determination and once grazing fees are paid the grazing bill becomes the authorization for grazing use for the determined season of use.

The Bear Springs, Pima, and Mesa Allotments are located in Graham County approximately 1.5 miles east of Pima, Arizona. This area is covered by the Glenbar, Arizona; USGS Quadrangle 7.5 Minute Maps.

IV. FINAL REVIEW

This proposed action qualifies as a categorical exclusion under the National Environmental Policy Act in accordance with 516 DM 11.9 D(1): Rangeland Management-Approval of transfers of grazing preference.

This categorical exclusion is appropriate in this situation because there are no extraordinary circumstances potentially having effects that may significantly affect the environment. It has been reviewed to determine if any of the exceptions described in 516 DM 2, Appendix 2, apply.

The action does not have significant adverse effects on public health and safety nor does the action adversely affect such unique geographic characteristics as historic or cultural resources, parks, recreation, or refuge lands, wilderness areas, wild or scenic rivers, sole or principal drinking water aquifers, prime farmlands, wetlands, floodplains, or ecologically significant or critical areas, including those listed on the Department's National Register of Natural Landmarks. The action does not have highly controversial environmental effects nor have highly uncertain environmental effects or involve unique or unknown environmental risk nor does it adversely affect a species listed or proposed to be listed on the list of endangered or threatened species. 
