Decision Memo Cloverleaf Storage Additions

USDA Forest Service, Southwest Region, Tonto National Forest Tonto Basin Ranger District, Gila County, Arizona (T5N, R13E, Section 30)

Decision

It is my decision to construct two separate 2500 gallon poly storage tanks each with a mounted solar panel and pump system on the Dutchwoman Allotment. The storage tanks will convert an existing gas operated pumping system into a solar powered pumping system for watering livestock.

Access to the project areas will be on Forest Service road 118 and 1766. Previous used access trails to construct the existing pipeline will be followed when transporting the storage tanks to their location. Only limited brush removal and trimming will be authorized to implement this project. Any galvanized steel used, must be painted and maintained to blend into the surrounding landscape. Construction of this project must be coordinated with District range staff and constructed in accordance to Forest Service Range Improvement Standards. Disturbance is to be minimal and only in areas covered by the site-specific archeological clearance (#2012-12-139).

I have concluded that this action may be categorically excluded from documentation in an environmental impact statement or an environmental assessment. It is within one of the categories identified by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in 36 CRF 220.6. The project is within Category 32.2 (9) that includes implementation or modification of minor management practices to improve allotment condition or animal distribution. There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the action as defined in the next paragraph.

Public health and safety will not be affected by this action. There are no know significant irreversible resource commitments or irretrievable losses to wildlife habitat, soil productivity, forage production, or water quality. No known cultural resources will be affected. A site-specific archeological clearance (#2012-12-39) has been completed in conjunction with forest archeologists and was approved by the Forest Supervisor. A site-specific Biological Evaluation has been completed and approved (Analysis # 2012-307). The proposal will not take place on steep slopes or on highly erosive soils. There are no wetlands within the project area. The project does cross small ephemeral drainages which will not be significantly impacted.

Public Involvement

Design of the project was coordinated with, Forest Service specialists including Range, Biology, Heritage, Hydrology, Soils and the permittee for the Dutchwoman Allotment.

Findings Required by Other Laws

The project is in Management Area 6J identified in the Tonto National Forest Land Management Plan (USDA 1985, as amended). The management emphasis for this area is to manage for a variety of renewable natural resources with primary emphasis on wildlife habitat improvement, livestock forage productions, and dispersed recreation. The design of this project is consistent with the standards and guidelines of the Land Management Plan. Effects to Management Indicator Species (MIS) were evaluated (Analysis # 2012-307). A biological

evaluation was prepared (BE # 2012-307) and found no effect to any Threatened or Endangered Species in compliance with the Endangered Species Act.

There are no inventoried roadless areas within the project area. Best Management Practices will be followed during project implementation in compliance with the Clean Water Act.

Implementation

Implementation of this project may begin immediately.

Administrative Review or Appeal

This decision is subject to administrative review (appeal) pursuant to 36 CFR Part 215. The appeal must be filed by US mail or hand-delivered to the Appeal Deciding Officer, Neil Bosworth, Forest Supervisor, at the following address: 2324 East McDowell Road, Phoenix, Arizona 85006. The appeal may also be faxed to the Forest Supervisor's attention at (602) 225-5295. Appeals, including attachments, must be filed within 45 days from the publication date of this notice in the Payson Roundup, the newspaper of record. Attachments received after the 45-day appeal period will not be considered. The publication date in the Payson Roundup, newspaper of record, is the exclusive means for calculating the time to file an appeal. Those wishing to appeal this decision should not rely upon dates or timeframe information provided by any other source.

Individuals or organizations who submitted comments during the comment period specified at 215.6 may appeal this decision. The notice of appeal must meet the appeal content requirements at 36 CFR 215.14. Relative to issuance of the term grazing permit, a permittee may choose to appeal under the regulations listed at 36 CFR 251, Subpart C. The permittee must select which administrative review regulation (36 CFR 215 or 251) he or she will opt to use. Both cannot be used for the same appealed decision. An appeal by the permittee under the 36 CFR 251 regulations must be filed simultaneously with the Tonto National Forest Supervisor Neil Bosworth at the address above, and with District Ranger Kelly Jardine at 28079 N. Arizona Highway 188, Roosevelt, Arizona 85545. The appeals must be filed within 45 days of the date of publication of legal notice in the Payson Roundup.
