Proposed Action/Type: Approval of transfers of grazing preference.

Proposed Action:

The proposed action is to transfer the grazing preference on the Muskhog Allotment No. 51800, a Section 3 grazing permit from Walter Wein to Klump Ranches LLC. The Muskhog Allotment is currently an active allotment and would be issued a permit for a period of ten years under the authority of Section 402(c)(2) of FLPMA, 1976 as amended. This permit would contain the same terms and conditions as the previous permit (see Terms and Conditions below).

The allotment is located 10 miles East of Willcox, AZ, in Cochise County on the following lands: T 14 S, R 26 E on all or part of sections 2, 3, and 11

The allotment is comprised of 1,105 acres of BLM-administered public land, and 327 acres of private land (see attached map).

In order to improve livestock distribution on the public lands, all salt blocks and/or mineral supplements will not be placed within a 1/4 mile of any riparian area, wet meadow, or watering facility (either permanent or temporary) unless stipulated through a written agreement or decision in accordance with 43 CFR 4130.3-2(c).

If in connection with allotment operations under this authorization, any human remains, funerary objects, sacred objects or objects of cultural patrimony as defined in the native American graves protection and repatriation act (p.l.101-601;104 stat. 3048; u.s.c.3001) are discovered, the permittee/lessee shall stop operations in the immediately area of the discovery, protect the remains and objects, and immediately notify the authorized officer of the discovery. The permittee/lessee shall continue to protect the immediate area of discovery until notified by the authorized officer that operations may resume.

As a term and condition of this permit you are required to submit a report of actual grazing use made on this allotment for the previous grazing period March 1 to Feb. 28. Failure to submit this report by March 1, of this year, may result in suspension or cancellation of grazing permit.

IV. FINAL REVIEW

The action would not have significant adverse effects on public health and safety nor would the action adversely affect such unique geographic characteristics as historic or cultural resources, parks, recreation, or refuge lands, wilderness areas, wild or scenic rivers, sole or principal drinking water aquifers, prime farmlands, wetlands, floodplains, or ecologically significant or critical areas, including those listed on the Department's National Register of Natural Landmarks. The action does not have highly controversial environmental effects nor have highly uncertain environmental effects or involve unique or unknown environmental risk nor does it adversely affect a species listed or proposed to be listed on the list of endangered or threatened species. It would not establish a precedent for future action nor represent a decision in principle about a future consideration with significant environmental effects. The proposed action would not adversely affect properties listed or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. The action would not threaten to violate a Federal, State, local or tribal law or requirements imposed for the protection of the environment or which require compliance with Executive Order 11988 (Floodplain Management), Executive Order 11990 (Protection of Wetlands) or the Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act.
